# **Course Description**

This course is the equivalent to an introductory college course focuses upon the important themes and concepts in comparative government. The course will include specific case studies. Cross-country comparisons will be made throughout the semester. The course objective is three fold: prepare students to pass the AP Comparative Government and Politics exam on May 14<sup>th</sup>, preparation for the rigors of a college course and to increase student's global political awareness.

## **Course Outline**

One semester course 8 units:

- Unit 1- Introduction to Comparative Politics (3 weeks)
- Unit 2- Mexico (1.5 weeks)
- Unit 3- United Kingdom (2 weeks)
- Unit 4- European Union (1 week)
- Unit 5- Russia (2 weeks)
- Unit 6- China (2 weeks)
- Unit 7 Iran (2 weeks)
- Unit 8- Nigeria (1.5 weeks)

### Grades

Grades earned by the student represent a cumulative points total for the semester. I do not give individual quarter grades. All grades received prior to semester final grade should be treated as a progress reports. Grades are based on coursework in the following 4 areas: (% are approximate)

- > Current Events (20%)- Current event presentation, panel discussion, and any related blog responses.
- > **Tests/quizzes (40%)-** Combination of multiple choice, short answer and essay at the conclusion of each unit.
- ➤ **Term Paper (15%)-** 6-12 pages typed. Due at end of the second week of November. Theme: Public Policy comparison
- > Final (15%) Presentation: Create a government.
- ➤ **Participation (10%)-** Journal responses, Socratic seminars, in class assignments, movie night, positive participation in class discussions

## Late Assignments

In general, **no late work** will be accepted. Assignments are considered on time if they are turned in the day they are due (presentations the period they are due). If a student is absent the day the assignment is due they can turn the assignment in upon their return assuming they have an excused absence. However there are exceptions. Any missed presentations will require the completion of alternate assignment due upon the return of the student (in the case of an excused absence). Late assignments because of unexcused absences will **not** be accepted.

### **Movie Night**

Throughout the semester there will be a chance for students to watch and discuss a movie that is related to the case studies. Unfortunately there is not enough time to accommodate viewing the films during regular class meetings. Please take note of the movie nights on the course calendars. Typically they will be on a Wednesday night at 6pm in room 305. For students who cannot attend the viewing and discussion session an alternate assignment will be made available. Some of the movies are "R" rated. If you object to your son or daughter viewing such films please indicate so on the bottom of the page. A list of the potential films is included with the syllabus.

### **Second Semester**

Students who are enrolled in AP Comparative Gov and Politics are required to remain in the same period for the second semester economics course that follows. The AP cohort will receive an economics course tailored to their AP Comparative Government and Politics needs, including review sessions and course material that will augment the 1<sup>st</sup> semester.

# My Expectations/Class rules

This is very simple: come to class prepared (always bring a notebook/journal to class, completed course readings), be a positive participant, and be respectful to your fellow students, the classroom, and me.

## Discipline procedure

Depending on the severity of situation, the following options exist:

- a) Go outside to "cool" off.
- b) Call home.
- c) Go to principal to "cool" off
- d) Go to principal and call home.
- e) Meeting with parents, counselor, and principal.
